
Genesis Club: Career Development Unit by Ruth Osterman and Kevin Bradley, Genesis Club

Since 1988, Genesis Club has been offering vocational training, education, employment, housing, wellness, and social supports to individuals struggling with mental illness. New members at Genesis club attend orientation and rotate between 6 different units: kitchen, membership, career development, environmental and facilities, and training and development. Members then choose one unit to join, although they continue to utilize services from the rest of the units. Within their unit, members distribute responsibilities so that they are all able to contribute to the club. One member Maura says she enjoys her duties at the club because she "[gets] help [herself], and help other people".

ment and education. Many members join the club with a main goal of attaining meaningful employ-

The career development unit focuses on vocational rehabilitation for the members through employ-

ment, and the career development unit often draws people in. The unit offers transitional employment positions that are temporary, for only around 9 months. The club has relationships with specific businesses in the area, and these job openings are reserved for clubhouse members. The Genesis staff provides training and absentee coverage for members in transitional employment positions. Once members feel comfortable with working their transitional employment job, they can move on to supported employment. While the clubhouse still provides assistance during the job search process, the members may need to interview for the jobs. These positions do not have a time limit on them. New members are often drawn in by the club's transitional employment program; Maura states "it's what got my foot in the door".



In addition to employment, Genesis club offers support for education. Many members had to take a break from school due to their mental illness, and the club helps them return to school and complete their degrees. The club helps members apply for their GEDs or for financial aid, and they even offer scholarships. Membership at Genesis Club offers access to an "intentional community of support

with a sense of ownership and belonging", says Ruth Osterman, staff at Genesis Club. In order to become a member, you must be referred by a healthcare professional. Kiva Center: Voice Hearer's Group by Vesper Moore, Kiva Center

group meets on Thursdays at 12:30 at the Kiva Center, located at 209 Shrewsbury St, Worcester MA 01604. The group is an space for those who hear voices and/or experience reality in different ways. Kiva is a recovery learning community that strongly values peer support. The organization is entirely peer-run, and they emphasize

the importance of social connection. They also promote acceptance and openness, and this transparency is well reflected in the design of their facility. By the entrance, there is a large open space with Native American artwork on the walls and soft music playing. One member said that she feels "a sense of calm the moment [she enters]". There are virtually no doors throughout the center, further fostering the sense of community that is central to their mission of wellness. In addition to the Voice Hearer's group, Kiva offers several other open support groups daily, with some that are specifically Spanish or Portuguese only. INSPIRING STORIES

Carlos Maclay is a member of Genesis Club who has greatly benefitted from their supported employment and education services. When he joined Genesis Club in January, Carlos had two primary goals: completing his education and obtaining his license. Carlos

had been a student at Clark University for two years before taking time off. Genesis helped him reapply, and even re-acclimated him to the school by taking him on tours so that he would feel comfortable returning. He was recently readmitted to Clark and will be returning there in the fall. In order for him to obtain his license, Genesis supported him by helping him find a driving school. Since joining the clubhouse, Carlos says he has "accomplished a lot of goals I wanted to accomplish". When Carlos initially joined Genesis club, he was not interested in working. He learned more about their transitional employment program,

UMass Medical School and saw several other members working there, he felt that he could fit in as well. Currently, he is metering in the UMass mailroom for 12 hours a week, and he reports that his job has been going "very well". Speaking of his progress and accomplishments, Carlos says "none of this would have been possible without the support of Genesis Club. Taking part in the daily tasks and working side by side with other members and

staff helped build my confidence and allowed me to pursue my goals."
